Our MACC Network acts as an economic and community multiplier investing over \$480m into our communities, employing more than 3,500 individuals, and engaging over 26,000 volunteers!

We adventured together at our Member Summit, revolutionized our hiring strategies, confronted workplace systems and social norms, explored our power as people leaders, built member capacity for data, reporting, and data justice, advocated with government leaders, and more!

Investing in IDEA:

Organizations across the network have been making new investments in their Inclusion Diversity Equity and Accessibility (IDEA) strategies, but are navigating the tension between focusing time on skills and tactics and what's emerging as a strong need develop capacity for true IDEA vision and strategy.

Workforce Investments:

Our members continue to adapt and evolve their workforce strategies to meet our current unique work place landscape! Our members continue to explore innovative equity strategies from employee power sharing to restructuring hiring practices!

Economic Volatility:

Our communities and members continue to feel the dual pressures of inflation and the end of pandemic supports. While some members have seen increases in government funding, other programs have faced dramatic cuts.

A Call to Collectivism:

The continuing, immense pressure on our members and communities show how vital our work is, and make it clear that we need to work together to build the new solutions that lead to a more equitable society.

KEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS

We released our Pandemic Report capturing the turmoil of the past three years but also honoring the power, resolve, innovation, and solidarity our network built with and within our communities.

We moved! After over 20 years downtown, MACC moved into a new building! We welcomed our staff and network to their new hub with a grand opening in May!

> MACC launched our Ask MACC: Workforce Solutions hub bringing together a web-based resource hub and capacity building trainings for our network!

MACC's Data Team and members made an exciting pivot in their mobile client communications work allowing them to become early adopters for a platform tailored to ClientTrack and member needs!

MACC staff continue to develop their leadership on IDEA (Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, & Accessibility) through our Culture Committee and small collaborative staff work groups or "Pods"

MACC completed strategic planning leading to a framework with a new Vision, Mission, and IDEA Commitment! The work spanned 16 months and was informed at all levels by members, staff, and Board leadership. We hosted another successful Member Summit over 3 thought provoking days, gathering together over 115 attendees, acting as representatives from 70% of our member organizations!

> MACC's Finance Team integrated 8 new members into their enterprise finance Continia software improving members' access to their accounts payable financials!

MACC continued our advocacy work as new issues emerged including advocating against retaliatory and undue funding restrictions in the wake of the Feeding Our Futures scandal.

> MACC's Data Team continues to advance our network's leadership in Data Justice deepening our network's expertise, capacity AND building the field by co-presenting on their learning and experiences!

> > MACC invested in our team's capacity adding several new team members, allowing our teams to deepen and diversify our skill sets, and investing in our internal leadership
